NICU - Oxygen Toxicity

Purpose/Description:

Oxygen is a drug that has been administered to more newborns worldwide than any other treatment. Supplemental oxygen is utilized in the NUCU to maintain normal physiologic processes required for life as well as to promote pulmonary vasodilation. Excessive supplemental oxygen, however, may damage lung tissues due to oxidative stress. This presentation details the pathophysiology of hyperoxia and describes the potential implications of excessive oxygen in the newborn population.
